


#### **Bring New Disciples to Christ**

Matthew 9:9, "And as Jesus passed forth from thence, He saw a man, named Matthew, sitting at the receipt of custom, and he saith unto him, Follow me. And he arose, and follow Him."

Even though we are not Jesus, we, as His disciples, have accepted the calling to follow Him. With this call-

ing, we inherited a great responsibility to go out into a dying world and witness to unbelievers the unadulterated truth of the good news of Christ to make new disciples and build God's Kingdom.

We, as believers, are commissioned to speak the gospel of Christ and testify of what He has done for us during





ing representative of Christ, and to speak the truth about what we have seen, heard, and the unbelievable experiences we have encountered during our incredible journey as a child of God, how He made a way out of no way because of our faith in Him, Hebrews 11:1.

I must admit that I am guilty of being judgmental when deciding who I

I must admit that I am guilty of being judgmental when deciding who I should witness, especially those I do not know. I would say to myself, "This person isn't ready to hear the Word of God based on their actions, appearance, occupation, and, most critically, their demeanor."

I will judge them based on my experience and how I acted and refused to hear the Word of God when Believers witnessed it to me. Based on my censurable behavior, I judged others not ready to hear God's Word. You see, because of my prejudice, my preconceived notion led me to miss an excellent opportunity to serve and be a witness for Christ to save souls. Who am I to judge anyone for not being worthy? Isn't one of the main charac-

worthy? Isn't one of the main characteristics and services of a Believer who walks with Christ to save souls? Thank God Jesus did not judge me according to my actions, appearance, occupation, and demeanor.

Matthew was a tax collector, and because of his profession, he probably was not embraced into the Jewish community. And because of his profession, the Jewish people hated and thought of him as a greedy, sinful, and traitorous sinner.

This example shows believers why we should never judge a book by its

cover. Jesus looks at a person's heart, their soul, not their demeanor, outward appearance, profession, and surely not their past history.

Christ called Matthew to be a disciple. Matthew was a tax collector, and he was disliked by his own kind. Because of his profession, he was judged by his own to be evil. Matthew describes Jesus walking by his tax booth and saying, "Follow me." Matthew reports that he rose and followed Jesus. Matthew 9:10, Jesus and His disciples were, having dinner in Matthew's home with many tax collectors and others labeled as sinners. Jesus answered a question from the Pharisees about why He was eating with these people. Jesus responds that the sick need a doctor, not the healthy. He tells the Pharisees to learn the meaning of the Scripture, speaking of the Old Testament, in which God says, He desires mercy, not sacrifice. Jesus declares that He has some to call sinners, not the righteous.

This question from the Pharisees was more of an accusation, accusing Jesus of eating with sinners. Why would a righteous man be associating with immoral people? The Pharisees would never share meals with people who openly break God's law. Nor would they lower themselves to be seen with anyone who didn't follow their own rules of conduct.

Jesus told them to learn the meaning of the Scriptures. So, let's go to the Old Testament and understand what Jesus is talking about. Jesus pointed out to the Pharisees that healthy people do not need a doctor. He says we should love and care for others and minister to those who are caught in sin. Jesus went back to Hosea 6:6, where God says, "I desire mercy, and not sacrifice." Jesus quotes the Greek translation of the Old Testament, known as the Septuagint. The Pharisees were not in the mercy business. Their strategy for motivating the people of Israel to live right before God was to set the standard very high and then live up to it themselves. From that position, they looked down in judgment on those who could not or would not join them in their pious lifestyles, Matthew 23:2-7. Jesus was willing to spend time with tax collectors, harlots, and other disreputable people. The Pharisees would not.

Jesus tells the Pharisees that He did not come to call the righteous; he came to call sinners. The Pharisees assumed themselves to be righteous already. They did not think they needed saving. Jesus came to call those who understood themselves to be sinful and needed mercy, forgiveness, and a Savior, Matthew 7:6.

Matthew wanted to introduce his old buddies, friends, and acquaintances to Jesus. I, for one, understood what he was doing because I had a friend, a godly friend who introduced me to Christ. So, Matthew had a dinner to make the introduction easy. I can recall the time when friends came together and had Tupperware parties. These parties were held to help someone earn extra cash. But. Matthew wanted to introduce his friends to someone who would give them eternal life, someone who could save their souls, not monetary gain to fill his pockets.

Soon after calling Matthew to follow Him, Jesus ate a meal with many tax collectors and sinners in Matthew's house. Matthew wanted to introduce his social circle to his Savior, Jesus Christ. The scribes and the Pharisees, who despised tax collectors, complained, but Jesus spending time with sinners perfectly aligned with His mission to seek and save the lost. Luke 19:10.

In Jesus' day, rabbis and other spiritual leaders enjoyed widespread respect and were highly esteemed in Jewish society. Almost everyone looked up to the Pharisees. The Pharisees and the different religious classes of Jesus' day would not have socialized with tax collectors known for corruption and embezzlement.

Throughout Jesus' ministry, He reached out to those who needed Him. He conversed with a despised Samaritan woman at a well; His disciples had a hard time understanding. John 4:27.

He forgives an immoral woman in Luke 7, touches a leper in Luke 5, and enters Zacchaeus' house and dines with him in Luke 19. Again and again, Jesus touched the untouchable, hung with the undesirable, and loved the unlovable.

Jesus chose to eat with us sinners because we needed to know repentance and forgiveness were available. As Jesus' ministry grew, so did His popularity among the social outcasts of society. Once Matthew was part of Jesus' inner circle, Jesus had more contact with sinners. Spending time with the tax collectors and sinners was the reason He came since He had not come to call the righteous, but sinners. Mark 2:17. Jesus came here to reach the lost. He went where needed to the sick, Luke 5:31.

Jesus sees us as individuals, not our labels or titles. He had compassion and sought to meet the needs around Him. In sharing the word of God, Jesus ate with sinners and spent time with them. When sinners see this, they are inspired to know Him better. They recognized Jesus as a righteous man of God and saw His compassion and sincerity.

It is not my job to judge who is worthy of witnessing. I must keep in my heart James 4:10, to humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and He will lift you up. If we are not walking with Christ, we cannot witness for Christ. It is absolutely imperative that we, as Believers, live a consistent Christian life. Let your light shine before men, Matthew 5:16.

Our Lord shared the gospel with many different people. He understood Nicodemus and the woman at the well, and He used that knowledge to draw them to Himself, John Chapters 3 and

4. Our approach too, should be personally tailored to meet their needs. As we meet and speak with unbelievers, we should be compelled and obliged to try to ascertain what is keeping them from salvation.

Reading the Gospel of John will show love is the key for successful witnessing. Jesus loved people so much that he bled and died on the cross. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we can learn to love people more. When we do, we will be more motivated to share the gospel since we desire to save people from eternal punishment. Love compels us to communicate the good news. The Holy Spirit will open doors for us by convicting people of their sins and stirring up a desire for salvation, and He will arrange for our paths to cross. Our job is to speak with people, explain that salvation is available to every sinner, and present the good news.

Speaking of the good news is something many of us have trouble with, as did Moses, Exodus 4:10. However, if we are walking as Christians, we should make it a habit to study and have a plan in place to be ready when we meet unbelievers. Most importantly, remember to rely upon the Holy Spirit to help guide and aid you. The Holy Spirit is the One who convicts and regenerates. You might fail, but realize that failure is acceptable, that God blesses us when we are rejected, Luke 6:22.

We should have an attitude of gratitude, meekness, and mildness. Then we will realize it is not our job to judge who is worthy; our heavenly Father will separate the wheat from the tares and the sheep from the rams. When we meet unbelievers, it is paramount to witness and share the good news of our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ.



#### Let's "Bag" Plastics.

By now we are, most amply, informed on the global explosion of plastic products that threaten a significant upset in our natural ecological balances. Uninterrupted, these natural balances have sustained and promoted for ages... life and living for all here on our sole and finite space, Mother Earth. Clean and nonhazardous air to breathe, untainted water sources from oceans to community waterways and streams, and ample accessible green space and supportive habitat are each synonymous with, and vital to healthy and sustainable living and recreation.



Plastics present a two-faced exhibition of merit and burden, of service and liability. Plastics are extensively made, utilized, and valued due to their inherent flexibilities in production and in use. and for their appreciable cost-effectiveness along with being shockingly cheap,


However, worldwide accumulation of plastics at our presently unsustainable rate has generated damaging sequences of environmental impact, including very evident and measurable biological injury.

A most recognizable and problematic issue with our current employ of plastics is the issue of disposition of used and spent plastic products. Very many plastic products, after a single and remarkably brief use, become waste. Would-be plastic camping items such as beverage bottles and caps, grocery bags, food containers and other packaging often become less-than-wisely disposed waste. As a waste product, plastics regularly produce detrimental environmental impact as well as create health risks and various ecological and biological toxicities

Grim circumstances face marine animals as millions of pounds of plastic continue to make their way into the oceans every year. Plastic pollution poses a substantial threat to the marine environment by putting marine species at higher risk of ingesting plastic, suffocating, or becoming entangled in plastic pollution.









debris is visible to the naked eye and can be seen on the surface of the water. Many of these whirlpools make their way down to the ocean floor... some two miles deep. The Great Pacific Garbage Patch, however, is not one single pile of trash in the ocean but rather refers to two distinct collections of marine plastic waste...620 thousand square miles across... double the size of Texas. A similar patch of floating plastic debris is found as well in the Atlantic

It has been long scientifically demonstrated that oceanic pollution seriously interferes with biological and geological oceanic processes that, by design, support earth's natural biologic and ecologic functions. Oceanic food chains and natural recycling processes are vital to planetary sustainability. Without them, there is certain, though not fully measured,

defined and implicit environmental instability.

Plastic materials persist and pollute long after their intended use is finished. Hence there is no end to the impact of plastics within a typical human lifespan. Depending on how plastic is handled, it may pose a significant threat to the environment and to the climate when it reaches the waste phase of its life cycle. Plastic doesn't decompose in the way food and paper do. Instead, it breaks down into extremely tiny

pieces. When these pieces shrink below five millimeters in size which is about the width of a small paperclip, they become what's known as microplastics. Microplastics that are smaller than a micrometer are called nanoplastics, which are small enough to cross the cell membrane and can interfere with normal cellular functions

Microplastics have been found in human livers, lungs, blood, veins, stomach tissues, kidneys, placentas, and breast milk. They are linked to serious health issues in humans. And they

> are found all over the world from Antarctica to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean, and even in clouds.

A plastic bag has average "working life" of 15 minutes. More



- Dusting and vacuuming regularly helps to remove excess dust that may contain microplastic fibers that could be inhaled or otherwise consumed.
- Minimize drinking from disposable plastic water bottles, if without choice, try to keep them out of the sun in a cool, dry environment. Disposable plastic water bottles degrade very easily in response to temperature change or friction, For water on the go, consider using a reusable stainless-steel bottle. It's better for the environment and better for your health.
- Filter your water. This can he effective at reducing many contaminants including microplastics.
- Use wood, glass, or steel cutting boards instead of plastic.
- Microwave your food in glass containers instead of plastic or takeaway containers which can release microplastic particles into food.

than one million bags are used every

440 million tons of plastics are produced each year. Plastic production, use, and disposal contributes about 1.8 billion tons of carbon emissions into our atmosphere annually. Estimates suggest that between 8 million and 11 million tons of plastic waste enter the ocean each year... the equivalent of dumping a garbage truck of plastic into the ocean every minute.

Most of the plastic we make (72%) ends up in landfills or the environment. Only 9% of the plastic ever produced has been recycled and the USA recycles only 5-6% of its disposable plastic. Current recycling has its limitations, and has not proven to be as effective as occasionally declared. However, it is imperative that we continue to refine recycling processes to generate more effective methods and healthier outcomes.

It is urgent that acceptable systems purposed to modify and regulate the use of plastic materials be adapted. We must "bag" (constrain) the employ and life cycle of plastic products by:

- (1) regulating their manufacture
- (2) standardizing their employ and appropriateness of use
- (3) unreservedly and with all haste embracing a circulatory economy..a system of circularity... for plastics that directs the manufacturer to end the use and disposition of it, and recycling standards for the various categories of plastics.

(4) considering the popular position offered by researchers and some governments on reducing the waste and pollution from plastics, which is to simply make less of it.

Such proposed constraints lie of course within the resolutions of policy makers, innovators, and commercial companies that seek to ensure a sustainable future. We must all lobby for these constraints through our political and marketing avenues. The good news is that such constraint is indeed possible, currently active, and continually developing and spreading...though not as fast as expected but with noticeable prominence and increasing proximity.

Legislative initiatives regarding the reduction of plastic usage are active and anticipated, and circularity has become a recognized and targeted effort on many environmental levels. For example,

- California Governor Gavin Newsom has signed a law fully banning plastic shopping bags in grocery stores.
- Just about every country in Europe has an EPR (extended producer plan) plan...a policy that requires plastic producers to fund post-use management of plastic materials.
- Ghana is also working to create a national program.
- An EU directive was enacted in July requiring that all single-use bottles have caps that remain attached. This is one of several policies designed to limit the amount of plastic litter...particularly the caps from single-use plastic bottles which are far more likely to find their way into the environment and pose an enormous risk to wildlife.

But what can the RVer do to support responsible utilization of plastics and the reduction of plastic pollution? Certainly, we all must maintain an appreciable mindfulness and become actively involved. RVers can:


- Employ alternative camping utensils such as steel, bamboo, compostable and reusable dining and storage utensils.
- Habitually initiate or support existing recycling activities both at home and within camp sites or camping communities, and share these activities and their results.
- RV clubs can devise and incorporate standard club environmental sustainability policy and protocol.
- RV clubs can circulate important information and updates regarding our environment such as with NAARVA VOICE publications.
- RV clubs can maintain regular environmentally friendly initiatives such as our current NAARVA tree-planting initiatives.
- Participate in communal political actions such as polling to compel elected officials to act accordingly.
- Participate in local or national ecobased organizations (KAB, Earthwatch, National Parks Service etc.).
- Read / watch informative books, documentaries etc. (IVEP offers a list of very interesting materials.)



Plastics bring widely appreciable value to society through their usefulness and have a range of valuable and unique properties such as...

- Outstanding durability, strong and tough, both chemical- and lightresistant.
- Wonderfully cheap compared with competing materials such as steel.
- Enable medical devices including surgical equipment, drips, aseptic medical packaging.
- Provide packaging that reduces food waste.
- Due to their light weight, plastics reduce transportation costs and CO2 emissions.

Though plastic pollution can cause a range of unwanted and damaging public and environmental distress, it must be highlighted that society is accountable for the creation and extent of this pollution. We most remain mindful of potentially unwanted consequences as we employ plastics, while responsibly using and disposing of them. We must continually seek opportunity for efficient management of the plastic life cycle toward optimal planetary sustainability for our <u>sole and finite space</u>, **Mother Earth**.
